Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you and also with you.

¶ Kneel or sit for the **Prayer of Preparation**

Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

¶ Remain kneeling or seated for the **Prayers of Penitence**

My brothers and sisters, as we prepare to celebrate the presence of Christ in word and sacrament, let us call to mind and confess our sins.

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, we have sinned against you and against our neighbour in thought and word and deed, through negligence, through weakness, through our own deliberate fault. We are truly sorry and repent of all our sins. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, who died for us, forgive us all that is past and grant that we may serve you in newness of life to the glory of your name. Amen.

Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent, have mercy upon you, † pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

The Priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words Let us pray.

God, who in generous mercy sent the Holy Spirit upon your Church in the burning fire of your love: grant that your people may be fervent in the fellowship of the gospel that, always abiding in you, they may be found steadfast in faith and active in service; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

¶ The Liturgy of the Word

¶ Sit for the First Reading (Proverbs 22: 1–2, 8,9,22,23)

At the end the reader says: This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

¶ Remain seated for the **Responsorial Psalm** (Ps. 146)

and join in singing the response Response and Chant: MHE



It is the Lord who keeps faith for ever, who is just to those who are oppressed. It is he who gives bread to the hungry, the Lord, who sets prisoners free. *(Response)*

It is the Lord who gives sight to the blind, who raises up those who are bowed down, the Lord who loves the just, the Lord, who protects the stranger. (Response) The Lord upholds the widow and orphan, but thwarts the path of the wicked. The Lord will reign for ever, Zion's God, from age to age. (Response)

¶ Remain seated for the Second Reading (James 2: 1–17)

At the end the reader says: This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

¶ Please stand for the Gospel Acclamation

and turn towards the Gospel reader



Cantor: Speak, Lord, your servant is listening: you have the message of eternal life. All: Alleluia (as above)

¶ Remain standing for the Gospel (Mark 7: 24-37)

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end of the Gospel the reader says: This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.** Mr Richard Hough (Licensed Reader)

¶ Stand for the **Nicene Creed**

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

Please bow for the next three lines:

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

¶ Kneel or sit for the **Prayers of Intercession**

The priest introduces the intercessions.

To the bidding Lord, in your mercy Please respond by saying **Hear our prayer**.

After the prayer for the faithful departed: Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord. **and let light perpetual shine upon them.** May they rest in peace **and rise in glory.**

The priest introduces a period of silent reflection and says a closing prayer.

¶ The Liturgy of the Sacrament

'Where two or three are gathered together in my name,' says the Lord, 'there am I in the midst of them.'

The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

¶ Remain standing for the Offertory Hymn

Thy hand, O God, has guided Thy flock, from age to age;
The wondrous tale is written, Full clear, on every page;
Our fathers owned thy goodness, And we their deeds record;
And both of this bear witness: One Church, one faith, one Lord. Thy heralds brought glad tidings To greatest, as to least;

Nor leave thy work undone; With thy right hand to help us, The victory shall be won; And then, by men and angels, Thy name shall be adored, And this shall be their anthem:



Pray, my brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the almighty Father.

May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church.

O God, who give us the gift of true prayer and of peace, graciously grant that through this offering, we may do fitting homage to your divine majesty and, by partaking of the sacred mystery, we may be faithfully united in mind and heart. Through Christ our Lord. **Amen**.



¶ Remain standing throughout the Eucharistic Prayer (B)

Father, you made the world and love your creation. You gave your Son Jesus Christ to be our Saviour. His dying and rising have set us free from sin and death. And so we gladly thank you, with saints and angels praising you, and singing:



We praise and bless you, loving Father, through Jesus Christ, our Lord; and as we obey his command, send your Holy Spirit, that broken bread and wine outpoured may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.


On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you. He broke the bread, gave it to them and said: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you;

do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine. Again he praised you, gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross. Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Great is the mystery of faith:



Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Apostles, the Martyrs and all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.



¶ Remain standing for the Lord's Prayer

Jesus taught us to call God our Father, and so we pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

¶ Remain standing for the Breaking of the Bread


We break this bread to share in the body of Christ. Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.

¶ Remain standing for the Invitation to Communion

Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those who are called to the supper of the Lamb.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you,

but only say the word, and I shall be healed.



¶ Kneel or sit for the Lamb of God

Distribution of the Sacrament

Anyone who has been baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and wishes to receive the love of the Lord Jesus in their life, is welcome to receive Communion at this service. Alternatively you may wish to come for a blessing: please keep your hands down and your head bowed to indicate this.

<u>Intinction</u> is the practice of dipping the bread wafers into the wine. This has implications for those who are gluten intolerant because traces of gluten are more likely to enter the wine. We therefore ask you **not to dip the wafer into the chalice**. Please remember that making your Communion in one kind is entirely acceptable.

If you do not wish to receive, you, as well as any children with you, are invited to come up with everyone else for a blessing. Please indicate that you would like a blessing by bowing your head and keeping your hands down.

¶ Remain kneeling or seated for the **Communion Hymn** Lord, we come to ask your healing, Teach us of love: All unspoken shame revealing, Teach us of love. Take our selfish thoughts and actions, Petty feuds, divisive factions, Hear us now to you appealing, Teach us of love. Soothe away our pain and sorrow, Hold us in love: Grace we cannot buy or borrow, Hold us in love. Though we see but dark and danger, Though we spurn both friend and stranger, Though we often dread tomorrow, Hold us in love. When the bread is raised and broken. Fill us with love: Words of consecration spoken, Fill us with love.

As our grateful prayers continue, Make the faith that we have in you More than just an empty token, Fill us with love. Help us live for one another, Bind us in love; Stranger, neighbour, father, mother-Bind us in love. All are equal at your table, Through your Spirit make us able To embrace as sister, brother, Bind us in love.
