Commemoration of the Lord's Entry into Jerusalem

¶ When the bell is rung, all gather under the tower

Acclamation

Hosanna to the Son of David.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

Behold your king comes to you, O Zion, meek and lowly, sitting upon an ass. Ride on in the cause of truth and for the sake of justice. Your throne is the throne of God, it endures for ever; and the sceptre of your kingdom is a righteous sceptre. You have loved righteousness and hated evil. Therefore God, your God, has anointed you with the oil of gladness above your fellows.

Hosanna to the Son of David.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

Welcome

Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you and also with you.

Introduction

The priest introduces the celebration:

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, during Lent we have been preparing by works of love and self-sacrifice for the celebration of our Lord's death and resurrection. Today we come together to begin this solemn celebration in union with the Church throughout the world. Christ enters his own city to complete his work as our Saviour, to suffer, to die and to rise again. Let us go with him in faith and love, so that, united with him in his sufferings, we may share his risen life.

¶ The people hold up palms or branches for the following prayer:

God our Saviour, whose Son Jesus Christ entered Jerusalem as Messiah to suffer and to die; let these palms be for us signs of his victory (the palms are sprinkled) and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

¶ Remain standing for the **Palm Gospel** (Luke 19: 28–40)

When the Gospel is announced the reader says:

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end:

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

Procession

Let us go forth, praising Jesus our Messiah.

All follow the procession and make their way to a pew

Processional Chant

Clear the road, make wide the way. (Each line is repeated by all)

Welcome now the God who saves

Fill the streets with shouts of joy.

(Cheers, shouts, wave banners, etc.)

Prepare the way of the Lord! (echo)

Prepare the way of the Lord! (echo)

Raise your voice and join the song, (echo)

God made flesh to us has come. (echo)

Welcome Him, your banners wave. (echo)

(Cheers, shouts, wave banners, etc.)

¶ As the procession approaches the Altar, all join in singing

Ride on, ride on in majesty!

Hark, all the tribes hosanna cry,

Thy humble beast pursues his road

With palms and scattered garments strowed.

Ride on, ride on in majesty!
In lowly pomp ride on to die:
O Christ, thy triumphs now begin
O'er captive death and conquered sin.

Look down with sad and wondering eyes
To see the approaching sacrifice.

¶ Remain standing for the **Collect**

After the procession, when all are in their places, the priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words:

Let us pray for a closer union with Christ, in his suffering and in his glory.

True and humble king, hailed by the crowd as Messiah: grant us the faith to know you and love you, that we may be found beside you on the way of the cross, which is the path of glory. **Amen.**

¶ The Liturgy of the Word

¶ Sit for the **Old Testament Reading** (Isaiah 50: 4–9a)

At the end the reader says:

This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

 \P Remain seated for the **Responsorial Psalm** (Ps. 31)

and join in singing the Response

Response and Chant: MHE



Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I am in distress.

Tears have wasted my eyes, my throat and my heart. (Response)

For my life is spent with sorrow and my years with sighs.

Affliction has broken down my strength and my bones waste away. (Response)

Those who see me in the street run far away from me.
I am like a dead man, forgotten, like a thing thrown away. (Response)

I have heard the slander of the crowd, fear is all around me, as they plot together against me, as they plan to take my life. (Response)

¶ Sit for the **New Testament Reading** (Philippians 2: 5–11)

At the end the reader says:

This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

¶ Stand for the Gospel Acclamation

and turn towards the Gospel reader



Cantor: Christ was humbler yet, even to accepting death,

death on a cross. But God raised him high,

and gave him the name which is above all names.

All: Praise to you, O Christ, King of eternal glory.

¶ Remain standing for the **Passion**

When the Passion is announced the reader says:
The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

It is customary to stand throughout the long reading of the Passion. If this causes any difficulties, however, please feel free to sit at any point.

At the end: This is the Passion of the Lord. No response is made.

¶ Sit or kneel for the Prayers of Intercession

We stand with Christ in his suffering. For forgiveness for the many times we have denied Jesus, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy.**

For grace to seek out those habits of sin which mean spiritual death, and by prayer and self-discipline to overcome them, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy**

For Christian people, that through the suffering of disunity there may grow a rich union in Christ, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy**

For those who make laws, interpret them and administer them, that our common life may be ordered in justice and mercy, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy**

For those who still make Jerusalem a battleground, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy**

For those who have the courage and honesty to work openly for justice and peace,

let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy

For those in the darkness and agony of isolation, that they may find support and encouragement, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy**

For those who, weighed down with hardship, failure, or sorrow, feel that God is far from them, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy**

For those who are tempted to give up the way of the cross, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy**

That we, with those who have died in faith, may find mercy in the day of Christ, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy**

Holy God, holy and strong, holy and immortal, have mercy upon us.

¶ The Liturgy of the Sacrament

¶ Stand for the Peace

Once we were far off, but now in union with Christ Jesus we have been brought near through the shedding of Christ's blood, for he is our peace.

The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

¶ Remain standing for the **Offertory Hymn**

A collection is taken for the mission and upkeep of the Church. The Altar is prepared and gifts of bread and wine are placed on it.


¶ Remain standing for the Prayer Over the Gifts

May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, for the praise and glory of his name, for our good, and the good of all his holy Church.


Jesus, true vine and bread of life, ever giving yourself that the world might live, let us share your death and passion: make us perfect in your love. **Amen.**

¶ Remain standing throughout the Eucharistic Prayer (B)



It is indeed right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ our Lord. For as the time of his passion and resurrection draws near the whole world is called to acknowledge his hidden majesty. The power of the life-giving cross reveals the judgement that has come upon the world and the triumph of Christ crucified.

He is the victim who dies no more, the Lamb once slain, who lives for ever, our advocate in heaven to plead our cause, exalting us there to join with angels and archangels, for ever praising you and singing:



Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Christ is the bread of life:



And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption.

As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the apostles, martyrs and all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.



¶ Remain standing for the Lord's Prayer

Let us pray with confidence as our Saviour has taught us.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

¶ Remain standing for the Breaking of the Bread

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.


Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.

¶ Remain standing for the **Invitation to Communion**

Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

Distribution of the Sacrament

The Eucharist and Intinction

Intinction is the practice of dipping the bread wafers into the wine. This has implications for those who are gluten intolerant as traces of gluten are more likely to enter the wine. We therefore ask you **not to dip the wafer into the chalice**.

Anyone who has been baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and wishes to receive the love of the Lord Jesus in their life, is welcome to receive communion at this service. The Chalice will be offered for those who wish to receive in both kinds. There is no compulsion about this. If you are worried about receiving the Chalice, please remember that making your Communion in one kind is entirely acceptable.

Alternatively you may wish to come for a blessing: please keep your hands down and your head bowed to indicate that this is your preference.

¶ Remain kneeling or seated for the **Communion Hymn**

If we'd been there so long ago, When Jesus died upon the cross, Would we have walked with him along That way of anguish, pain and loss?

Would we have stood and watched him there, And heard him cry with dying breath? Would we have seen him give his life, And hand the victory to death?

Would we have grasped what nailed him there – It was our pride and cruelty,

The Priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words Let us pray.

Lord Jesus Christ, you humbled yourself in taking the form of a servant, and in obedience died on the cross for our salvation: give us the mind to follow you and to proclaim you as Lord and King, to the glory of God the Father. **Amen.**

Faithful God, may we who share this banquet glory in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, our salvation, life and hope, who reigns as Lord now and for ever. Amen.

¶ The Dismissal

¶ Remain standing for the Notices and Banns of Marriage

¶ Remain standing for the **Solemn Blessing**

The Lord be with you and also with you.

May the Father, who so loved the world that he gave his only Son, bring you by faith to his eternal life.

Amen.

May Christ, who accepted the cup of sacrifice in obedience to the Father's will, keep you steadfast as you walk with him the way of his cross.

Amen.

May the Spirit, who strengthens us to suffer with Christ that we may share his glory, set your minds on life and peace.

Amen.

And the blessing of God almighty, † the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. **Amen.**
